Messages from the Board and Executive Director



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Pal Martensson, Regional Director for Oceania

Oceania, this pearl band of islands that is the largest district in the World Cleanup Day puzzle. The giant Australia, the hidden New Zealand and tiny Tuvalu—all are important parts of our worldwide network.

We have communicated and forged new ties with several countries and welcome everyone; Australia is a new partner that we are extra happy to have on board. No More Butts is a fantastic NGO that specialises in cigarette butts—they do excellent work. Many cleanups have taken place throughout the year, thanks to all the great people who are a part and our base in the organisation—without you, we are nothing.

Samoa had a cleanup to collect baseline data that contextualises solutions and interventions to address marine litter and plastic pollution. Through a very important brand audit, they found that over 77% of the plastic counted could be categorised as single-use plastics. Out of this data came several recommendations that the Team Samoa WCD can target to address marine litter, in order to improve waste management systems and the health of our oceans.

Kiribati, another tiny island, consists of 33 islands scattered over an area of more than 3.5 million square kilometres in the central Pacific Ocean. They now have a cleanup programme, waste management system and recycling points growing in the area. Local initiatives have provided incentives for cleaner villagers, such as through annual "tidy village" competitions. There is a need for more systematic, well planned longerterm public campaigns, in particular to raise awareness about segregating and recycling waste products. Logistics is hard in Oceania but there are many good projects going on, covering activities, relationships and materials. Activities includes collections, drop off, reuse and product take back. Relationships covers contracts, customers, vehicles, gear and equipment. And materials is sorting, storing, processing and sales. There is never an away—especially not in the Oceania area :).



Bill Willoughby, Regional Director for North America

COVID has cast a large cloud over groups of people engaged in supporting the environmental movement; this has been a challenge for the past couple of years. The post-COVID period has been a motivating and challenging experience for developing our cleanups. We have developed new strategies and technologies to further enhance participation by municipalities, businesses, institutions, and organisations that have not previously engaged in the cleanup movement. By using new strategies and technologies to inform people, World Cleanup Day is important not only because it helps tackle the issue of mismanaged waste across countries, but also because it can spark important policy discussions around waste management and plastic pollution.

Our core belief is the notion that people want to do the right thing; all they need is a little encouragement or incentive. Just think what would happen if the Let's Do It World movement is able to further energise millions more people to engage in cleanups within their local communities.



Leo Lin, Regional Director for Asia

2022 was a tough year for our communities contributing to World Cleanup Day (WCD), but it also highlighted our resilience in Asia. In 2022, our Indonesia team maintained its 1.8 million volunteers for cleanups, our Japan team kept its 40% growth rate, and our Taiwan team innovated environmental education to motivate young WCD volunteers. These impressive achievements can be attributed to Asia WCD family's enthusiasm as well as support from HQ and other WCD regions.

What were the highlights for us this year? First, we understood our leaders' challenges and needs. After I started my role as board member, I collaborated with Agustina Iskandar, our Asia coordinator, to contact each country leader in Asia. We listened to everyone and understood their difficulties and needs. Furthermore, we piloted a series of speeches titled ReLeaf to trigger potential fundraising for each country in Asia. I leveraged my network to invite 17 entrepreneurs and experts and had them share sustainability topics with our Asia leaders. Additionally, I facilitated some fundraising discussions. For example, a sustainable straw company met an Indonesian leader for potential cooperation.

Lastly, we maintained the engagement among our Asia leaders by hosting the Asian Leaders Academy. Agustina and I worked closely with our Taiwan team to host our virtual Asian Leader Academy in July which included volunteer teenagers with impressive talents, for example—composing a rap song about environmental awareness. In 2023, we will host the Asia Leaders Academy in Taiwan physically, and the in-person and virtual events will be facilitated by Heart Valley ESG Education Park, an influential NGO in Taiwan. **Please keep a look out for updates regarding Asia Leaders Academy 2023.**

Sankofa: Looking back at the past year to plan for the future of Let's Do It in Africa

What a year this has been for the Let's Do It Africa team! Across Africa, we saw the Let's Do It movement continue to inspire millions across the continent to unite and act towards a clean Africa. We saw more countries sign up to join our ever-growing Let's Do It Africa family. All this was possible because of the hard work and passion of our leaders across the continent.

When I took up the mantle from Stephan in January, I had no idea how the year would pan out. Slowly but surely things began to take shape. We had our first ever tour of duty in Estonia for Kenyan Government officials, organised by Let's Do It World in collaboration with Let's Do It Kenya. Then Let's Do It Namibia and the Government of Namibia successfully completed the Sustainable Environment Education Project, with tons of lessons to be learnt from the pilot as we think through scaling it to other countries to promote experiential learning in schools and communities. Let's Do It Ghana participated in, and was a finalist for, the Afri-Plastics challenge—for their community centred solutions to reduce plastic usage across Sub-Saharan Africa.

We definitely will be borrowing lessons learned from the good work we did in 2022, and taking them through to 2023. We're counting on you to continue to stand with us through it all.

The year 2022 was frightening in many ways. All around the world, we saw unprecedented floods, severe droughts, heatwaves and powerful snowstorms. Not to mention wars and conflicts in a number of countries. These events are all signs that we no longer have much time to bring about change. The coming years will be decisive for us and for the world.

For the LDIW HQ, the year 2022 was challenging—as it was in many countries. The war in Ukraine, which started in February, made the HQ team quickly change plans and work together with the Ukrainian team as much as possible to organise humanitarian aid. We worked around the year on joint environmental programmes with the Georgian team and on a sustainable environmental education programme with the Namibia team. We also hosted public sector delegations from Kenya and Brazil, worked hard to kick off the process of World Cleanup Day to become an official UN Day-in collaboration with UN-Habitat and the Ministries of Environment and Foreign Affairs of Estonia. More than in previous years, we visited high-level conferences to spread the word about World Cleanup Day as a proven tool to create change. Together with Germany, we put effort into corporate funding policy to help leaders to evaluate their partners and avoid greenwashing. We improved the global World Cleanup Day registration system to provide local cleanup organisers with a convenient tool for cleanups, and hosted the World Cleanup Day Call and Media Center in Tallinn. A lot of plans remain as plans, which has taught us to be in the moment and work in the flow to serve the network and serve the cause of a waste-free world.

We are all in this movement for a reason. With different backgrounds but with the same goal—together, we are the change.

Our plastic pollution crisis is a global problem. A problem that often seems overwhelming. A problem that cannot be solved by one person, but only collectively. Naturally, it was a great honour to be named an ambassador for World Cleanup Day, giving my face to the global effort of mobilising and inspiring people to do their part. A great honour to go out on World Cleanup Day and repair some of the already existing damage, and be role models for a plastic-free lifestyle and conscious consumption beyond that single day."



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Faatiha Aayat World Cleanup Day Youth Ambassador

Faatiha Aayat is an eleven-year-old sixth grader, presently living in New York, USA. Besides being a World Cleanup Day Youth Ambassador, she is a child rights activist and climate campaigner who regularly raises her voice against global warming, climate change, carbon emissions, fossil fuels etc. Additionally, she is the author of four published books and has pursued the professional development programme on "Becoming a Leader" from the University of Harvard's Department of Continuing Education. She also received the Amazing Artist Award in the "Ocean Under Threat" category at the Advena World Art Competition.

Our Story

LDIW is the largest environmental organisation in the world, with active members and teams in 164 countries. We are a unique network which is bonded together through our joint event, World Cleanup Day, which has already engaged more than 71 million people globally.

LDIW started as a movement in Estonia, when 50,000 people cleaned up Estonia in just five hours on 3 May 2008. Since then, many countries have followed Estonia's example and joined the movement. The Let's Do It Foundation was founded in 2011, to coordinate an international cleanup project. In 2012, a series of cleanups took place in 96 countries under the name of World Cleanup 2012.

The first ever World Cleanup Day—a single day cleanup taking place simultaneously around the world—happened in 2018. On that day, 18 Million people from 157 countries came out to pick up waste! In 2019, the Let's Do It movement was reorganised and Let's Do It World NGO was founded as a collectively-governed organisation.

In 2019, the second World Cleanup Day took place in 180 countries, and engaged a record number of participants more than 21 million people around the world. In 2020 and 2021, we did something which sounded impossible until it was done! We organised World Cleanup Day in the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Today, World Cleanup Day has reached the majority of the world's countries—with people from 191 countries taking part across 2021 and 2022.

Impact Model

Let's Do it World's ultimate vision is a waste-free world. The transformation needed globally to tackle climate change, biodiversity decline and the waste crisis is a complex one. It will affect diverse stakeholders, with multiple factors and layers embedded deeply in the way society currently functions. World Cleanup Day—the flagship project of LDIW—can only have a long-term impact if it awakens everyone in society to step up and take action.

Our Impact Model explains how we expect World Cleanup Day and other LDIW activities to bring about a healthy and wastefree world. World Cleanup Day is a trigger for individuals, organisations and governments to take action. Our Impact Model shows how World Cleanup Day will have a longterm impact only if other stakeholders use the momentum to create systemic change. Individuals have to adopt a sustainable lifestyle; businesses have to implement circular


and regenerative business models, and governments need to adopt supportive legislation for a circular and regenerative economy.

We see the role of Let's Do It World as engaging, educating and acting as a catalyst for this much-needed transformation. That's why we aim to engage at least 5% of each country's population. This is the tipping point needed to create societal change and speed up the transformation towards a sustainable future.

The LDIW Impact Model acts as a guide to be built upon. Each country in the LDIW network has its own, country-specific Impact Model.

Let's Do It World is a unique network of passionate leaders and teams in 164 countries. In our role of empowering and educating, we are educating the new generation of future leaders around the world to lead the societal transformation needed to create a waste-free world.



All of this has become a daily baseline of work for many Let's Do It World network teams.

The inspiration to continue working towards World Cleanup Day, and to share best practice with others, is something that is created from within the network. The Let's Do It World HQ cannot express enough its humble gratitude to all our network leaders and teams. We work together, united around a global strategy created with the network and approved by the Let's Do It World General Assembly—the 67 countries which take on a higher level of responsibility for the organisation's development.





The Let's Do It World global movement—with its leaders and teams creating enormous positive change in their societies—have been recognised on both the local and global level. We are so proud to share some of the awards here, and congratulate the teams for their impactful work.



Last year, the all-Ukrainian youth movement Let's Do It Ukraine <u>received an 'Honourable Mention' UN SDG Action</u> <u>Award</u> for the implementation of their international humanitarian project, "Let's do it Ukraine SOS". The finalists were chosen from among 3,000 nominees from 150 countries. Congratulations!

Let's Do It Turkey received the Zero Waste NGO Award 2022 for the World Cleanup Day in Turkiye. Congratulations!

Past awards have also recognised the enormous work of the Let's Do It World global network around the World. For example, being the winner of the <u>UN-Habitat Scroll of Honor</u> <u>Award 2021</u>.

In 2019, World Cleanup Day was the Finalist of the Energy Globe Award 2019.

And before that, an award for the World Cleanup Day action in 2018 was given by the UNESCO and Japan—the <u>UNESCO-</u> Japan Education of Sustainable Development prize.

We are very grateful for all the regional and local prizes and recognition. It means a lot for the network's tireless leaders and volunteers, who are working for a cleaner world for every living being on Earth!



World Cleanup Day 2022

World Cleanup Day took place on 17 September 2022 in 190 countries—engaging 15 million people, despite wars, conflicts and natural disasters.

Natural disasters, conflicts, wars and politics

The events on World Cleanup Day 2022 have proven that the world has not calmed down since the Covid-19 pandemic hit. Every year, we're witnessing more natural disasters and extreme weather conditions as a result of climate change.

Unprecedented monsoon rains in **Pakistan** have caused widespread flooding and landslides across the country, affecting half the country and millions of people. Despite this, the Pakistan team—who usually engage 2-3 million people for World Cleanup Day—still managed to hold smaller clean-ups in the south with 15,000 people. There were also heavy rains in **Croatia, Romania, Kosovo, Slovenia, Macedonia, Belgium, Costa Rica and Cameroon**, who had to either cancel their events or run small-scale cleanups with brave volunteers. Some countries, such as **Bulgaria** and some parts of **China**, had storms in the week before World Cleanup Day.

But there were not only storms. Cleanups were stopped due to hot weather in **Suriname** and **Tunisia**. People in **Palestine** cleaned up at historical sites in very early hours, when the weather wasn't yet too hot.

The world has also become restless—we're witnessing more conflicts and wars. **Afghanistan** carried out cleanups despite the Taliban not believing in civic actions. **Kyrgyzstan**, the country who last year engaged around 10% of its population, postponed the cleanup just a day before World Cleanup Day, due to an attack from Tajikistan. **Ukraine** has suffered a lot as a result of the war with Russia. However, they still gathered nearly 120,000 people to clean up in secret cleanup spots in war zones, along with an online briefing on "The basics of mines and how to ensure the security of civilians". Many Ukrainians also cleaned in the countries to which they have escaped from the war. For example, in one area of **Poland**, up to one third of the participating families were Ukrainian.

Iran struggled with WCD 2022 almost being postponed due to one of Iran's most important religious mourning rituals. Some countries, such as **Gabon** and **Denmark**, were disturbed by elections.



Social impact

There was also a lot of incredible cooperation, positive impact and new records set on World Cleanup Day 2022—giving hope that by coming together we can change course towards a sustainable future. World Cleanup Day marked a new beginning for the whole of **Cyprus** to unite and take collective responsibility for looking after their beautiful island. For the first time in its history, both the Greek and Turkish sides of the island came together to clean their shared home.

The Netherlands recognised the need to take action on their waste exports, since they are the biggest plastic exporter in Europe—and one of the largest in the world, according to Plastic Soup Foundation. Last year, 70 million kilos of plastic waste from The Netherlands ended up in Indonesia. This year's Dutch clean-up team, together with 40,000 participants and 30 corporate sponsors, worked closely with Indonesia to resolve this issue. The team focuses on advocacy to make sure the waste doesn't end up in other countries—with the eventual aim of banning the export of plastic waste outside the EU. On a positive note, the European Union is already working on upgrading its waste shipment regulations. The message to all countries—let's clean up our own countries, and make sure the trash doesn't end up in someone else's.

Children and youth





Waste doesn't recognise borders, and not only when it comes to exports. While **Taiwan** has a good recycling system, currents bring waste from the sea onto the beaches. Over 15,000 people contributed to building a waste-free world by cleaning up the beaches of Taiwan.

Mozambique proved that by working hard, it is possible to engage a critical mass of society—and activate them to work together towards a clean and healthy planet. Last year about 250,000 Mozambicans volunteered in cleaning up local areas, but in 2022 it was eight times as many! Two million people joined in—more than half of which were school children. The leader of the country Carlos Serra sees education as an important tool to plant seeds for the future.

Mozambique is not the only country who saw the importance of engaging children and youth to build a sustainable society. In **Estonia**, 93% of participants were children and youth—a strategic decision to prevent littering and raise awareness of the need to protect the environment and live in harmony with it. There was also a special focus on children and youth in **Germany**, **Chad**, **Poland**, **Spain**, **Côte d'Ivoire**, **India**, **Sweden**, **Tanzania**, **Morocco**, **Democratic Republic of Congo** and many other countries. In many cases, children picked up trash such as cigarette butts—or empty alcohol bottles by the lake, as was the case in **Myanmar**. Young people in Brazil became inspired on World Cleanup Day—understanding that it is essential to break free from trash and change the world. Kids in **Spain** proclaimed that they were proud to be picking up plastic—and they do not want to see fish dying because of them. The **United Kingdom** involved young people from prisons to clean up the environment, with a very positive impact. The idea is set to be replicated in the USA. **Venezuela** organised a specific cleanup day prior to World Cleanup Day for kids and disabled people, and one on another day with indigenous people. The main day itself was dedicated to cleaning up the ocean.

Beaches, seas and oceans

Canada focused on marine waste as well. They came together with fishermen to clean up the sea of fishing pollution, such as old nets. Iceland, too, put all their focus on the ocean. Tomas Knutsson, the founder of LDIW in **Iceland** is passionate about cleaning the planet thanks to his years of experience as a diver—seeing the glory of the underwater world as well as all the pollution. He has been on this mission for 27 years.



Different types of cleanups



Cambodians celebrated World Cleanup Day 2022 by bringing together music and river cleanups. Since February 2022, they have collected about 120 tonnes of trash (!) from the rivers.

People in **Denmark** collected trash while hiking and kayaking. Denmark is the country that produces the biggest amount of waste per capita in Europe, but all of society is engaged in cleaning up and reducing the waste.

Greece wants to clean up all the waste from one mountain, to create the first ever zero plastic mountain. They plan to create a museum of all the odd plastic things they find on the mountain—for example, a coke bottle from the 1980s.

World Cleanup Day is already a well-established part of **Latvian** society and engages the public well. Everyone takes part in this movement—the government, big companies and people of all ages and abilities. People are not only participating in World Cleanup Day, they are also planting "trees of happiness" to make the country even more beautiful :)

Clean countries and tourism

Keeping countries clean and beautiful helps to increase tourism and national income. People in the Bahamas came to the conclusion that preserving nature in a popular tourist destination such as theirs is important—so that others can admire **Bahamas** in the future. In the **Maldives**, cleanups were focused on the smaller local islands, as the tourist areas are relatively clean, while the smaller islands are not. In November, Sharm el Sheikh in **Egypt** hosted COP27, and Egyptians cleaned their country before the guests arrived. The Nile is a symbol of Egyptian heritage—but according to the World Economic Forum, it is also one of the 10 rivers that contribute 90% of the garbage in the world's oceans. Cleaning up the Nile was a focus of these efforts.



We are getting cleaner!

A very positive problem—in countries such as Estonia and Curacao, teams reported that the countries are becoming so clean that volunteers struggled to find littered places to clean. Hopefully that "problem" will increase year-by-year, globally!

In summary, 36 countries—19% of all participating countries—did their best cleanup ever compared with cleanups from 2018 to 2021. And 86 countries—45% of all participating countries—had higher participation numbers compared with 2021.

14 867 374 people participated in World Cleanup Day 2022. All in all, around **60 000 tons of garbage** were removed from nature. Volunteers gave around **30 million hours** to protect the environment in just one day.

Between 2018 and 2022, a total of 197 countries have participated in World Cleanup Days, with a total of 71,375,919 people participating.

According to our records, the only countries that have not participated in any of the World Cleanup Days are **Belize**, **Liechtenstein**, **Solomon Islands**, **Eswatini**, **Turkmenistan** and **Tuvalu**. We are looking forward to welcoming these countries to our big family.



Impact of World Cleanup Day 2022

World Cleanup Day is more than just a cleanup. It's about creating an impact and catalysing a shift in society.

According to the LDIW Leaders Survey 2022*, **69% of LDIW country leaders were satisfied with the results of World Cleanup Day** in their country. The highest levels of satisfaction were in Europe (78% of leaders) and the lowest in Africa (48% of leaders).

> 69% of leaders satisfied with WCD 2022 results

62% of leaders found World Cleanup Day's impact to be strong in raising awareness of waste pollution in their country. Compared with European leaders, African leaders were less satisfied with the awareness raising impact of World Cleanup Day. In general, African leaders have an unmet desire to build stronger relationships with authorities—in order to sustain lasting change, and to work for effective waste management solutions and supportive legislations.

Leaders who were already organising cleanups prior to World Cleanup Day—and have been doing so for 8-10 years now—can today witness the impact of World Cleanup Day in their countries. Leaders in the Americas and Europe, who generally have the longest experience with cleanups in the global network, have reported a stronger impact of World Cleanup Day compared to leaders in Africa and Asia.

Leaders have reported that year-on-year they have seen higher levels of participation, more press coverage, more independent cleanups, and more government involvement on World Cleanup Day.

The engagement of the public sector is critical to create sustainable change. We are proud that **municipalities were**

involved in 80% of countries, with increasing involvement in the national public sector as well. Representatives from the national public sector participated in 69% of countries, environmental ministers participated in 38% of countries, and other ministers joined in 27% of countries. However, we are looking forward to more Presidents joining in future only 2% of countries reported that their President had participated.

In general, **leaders feel satisfied that World Cleanup Day is rooted in their society** and becoming an official day in many communities.

Our leaders do organise follow-up projects after World Cleanup Day—such as educational programmes in schools (62% of countries), in communities (61% of countries), in corporations (55% of countries), as well as running waste sorting or composting programmes (39%) and other activities (26%).

21% of countries spend between \$50K and \$1 Million (USD) on the World Cleanup Day campaign, while 40% of countries spend less than \$5K. Raising funds and creating systemic change remain the biggest challenges for the majority of countries.

89% of leaders very motivated to organise WCD 2023

89% of LDIW leaders feel very motivated (7 or more out of 10) to organise the next World Cleanup Day on 16 September 2023, and motivation has risen compared to the same period in 2021. Only 5% of leaders don't feel very motivated—most of these being leaders who have organised World Cleanup Day for more than 5 years in a row.

The most important impact of World Cleanup Day is to bring people together—raising awareness about the waste problem and catalysing cooperation between different sectors to work towards a sustainable and waste-free world.

World Cleanup Day Inspirational stories

AFGHANISTAN

On World Cleanup Day, 17 September, the Let's Do It Afghanistan team organised a clean-up in Kabul and the Nigarhar provinces of Afghanistan. We mobilised 800 volunteers, who engaged either individually or in groups, to clean their cities and villages. Altogether, they collected approximately 10 tons of trash. The purpose of this cleanup campaign was not only to clean up the waste but to promote a culture of civic action and volunteerism in Afghan society. The Bureau for Rights-Based Development (BRD) actively strives to raise awareness among citizens, communities and stakeholders around their everyday responsibilities with regards to the environment, and to provide opportunities to work together to tackle the serious problem of environmental degradation.

Afghanistan is currently suffering from dire humanitarian crises. We have continued to use these cleanup campaigns to promote and create a civic space, in which the community and civil society can engage—working together with the community to tackle these problems.

The Let's Do It Afghanistan cleanup campaign is planned and managed by the Bureau for Rights-Based Development (BRD), a rights-based development organisation operating in Afghanistan since 2002.



INDONESIA

Taking first position as the country with the most volunteers in total over the five World Cleanup Days—when adding up the sum of participant numbers from 2018 to 2022—is certainly an accomplishment! However, World Cleanup Day Indonesia's team efforts don't stop there—in 2022 we have been actively moving to a hybrid format (with both online and offline initiatives) in the middle of the Covid-19 pandemic that is still hitting Indonesia.

In addition to cleanups in 34 provinces across Indonesia, numerous provincial teams are also organising educational activities for the general public and schools. Waste sorting, waste management, the impact of waste on our wellbeing and environment, waste banks and other waste-related topics are covered in the various educational activities conducted.

World Cleanup Day Indonesia has collaborated with various stakeholders—such as the government, companies, communities, schools and others. Our movement is supported by government officials from multiple levels, such as the national/state level (Ministry of Environment and Forestry; Coordinating Ministry for Maritime Affairs and Investment; Coordinating Ministry for Human Development and Culture), provincial level, city/regional level, and even village level. The Indonesian Ministry of Environment and Forestry includes World Cleanup Day on its annual calendar and actively mobilises Environmental Service workers at the provincial and regional (city/district) levels to support the yearly cleanup action in September.



This year, World Cleanup Day received great enthusiasm from the public. As a result, cleanup activities lasted almost a month—from 10-25 September—all across Indonesia. As the grand event, World Cleanup Day Indonesia's team collaborated with the European Union to organise a plogging initiative as part of the EU Climate Diplomacy Week. Besides the annual cleanup event, the National Team also runs monthly activities. For example, a webinar, a school roadshow, an educational event/ workshop, an Instagram Live and building a network with other environmental communities.

The spirit of cleanups does not appear only during the annual event. After the main event, the National Team also conducted a digital cleanup and a free decluttering service—to repurpose unused resources from citizens' houses. Some regions even have regular weekly and monthly cleanups. This demonstrates how the World Cleanup Day movement is gradually becoming a sustainable initiative for the preservation of the environment. We hope to maintain this spirit for many years to come.



Mexico is a very diverse country in terms of flora and fauna—each state within the country has much biodiversity. As a movement, we seek to preserve and take care of the ecosystems, with cleaning brigades and activities working to protect the environment. Our activities are committed to the continuous improvement of habitats, working in collaboration with NGOs, companies, government, local communities and a lot of goodwill.

All activities are carried out by teams nationwide, which we call "Operative Cells", and which work in the interior of the country. In 2022, Let's Do It Mexico engaged 379 teams with 2,385,720 volunteers from schools, universities, communities and other NGOs. Following the cleanups, we managed to reforest more than 4,000,000 trees across each participating state, further contributing to the impact of WCD 2022!

This year, we managed to work with staff in more than 65 companies to carry out environmental awareness activities, in addition to participating in environmental events recognised by the country and the Mexican government. There are already 18 out of the 32 Mexican Republic states participating in World Cleanup Day.



To raise awareness, we appeared on national media with a reach of more than 1 million people!

For the first time in the world, we created a cigarette recycling plant, to convert cigarette butts into cellulose. We collected more than 8 million cigarette butts, and worked with the government to generate law initiatives in favour of recycling them.

To celebrate WCD 2022, we created a great race in Mexico City and a festival. Throughout the year, we have carried out more than 200 Digital Cleanups, participated in conferences for companies, raised awareness in schools and universities and held exhibitions at events. Thanks to our initiatives, we managed to save 1,904,000 lights from being left on.



UKRAINE

On September 17, 2022, Ukrainians joined in on World Cleanup Day together with 191 countries around the world. Despite the full-scale war, 119,926 participants in 24 regions of Ukraine and abroad joined the largest eco-event of the year in Ukraine.

Schoolchildren, students, representatives of state authorities, socially responsible businesses, media, star ambassadors, eco-activists and concerned citizens cleaned 5,133 locations together. By combining efforts, 2,368,228 kilograms of waste were collected, and 70,547 kilograms of secondary raw materials were handed over for processing. The volunteers donated the funds received for the secondary raw materials to support the Ukrainian army. Citizens participated in traditional cleanups, collective cleanups on the grounds of institutions and organisations; individual cleanups (in particular, cleaning at home and collecting warm things for charity/humanitarian hubs); demolition of debris; plogging (collecting trash while jogging), and forming a national map at www. recyclingpoints.org with "Find, sort, return" recycling points (sorting recyclables and sending them for recycling).

Connected to the war situation, the All-Ukrainian youth movement "Let's do it Ukraine" also added a new format for participation via the internet—a digital cleanup. During the event, 1,507,164 GB of digital garbage was cleaned. Together, participants saved the environment from emitting 376,379 tons of CO2 into the atmosphere, and avoiding the use of 753,582 kWh of energy per year.





ESTONIA

Over time, World Cleanup Day has changed and developed significantly in Estonia. In 2018, when we invited individuals to participate, the participation level was rather low— 10,000 volunteers.

The main Let's Do It action in Estonia takes place in May, as was originally the case in 2008. The idea to organise a World Cleanup Day in September in addition was a new one—and people were sceptical whether Estonia needed two days of action. In the following years, we developed a cleanup format for schools and kindergartens. We also came up with environmental talking points, inviting all Estonian educational institutions to participate. Today, the majority of cleanup volunteers in Estonia are young people; in 2022 the number grew to 45,000 students. For one school, the cleanup ended with a big concert, which was raffled off among the participating schools.

Starting in 2021, we started inviting companies to participate in cleanups. In 2022, the focus was on communities and community-organised clean-ups. The development of these directions is also our highest priority for 2023.

Today, the number of World Cleanup Day participants has grown to 50,000—making it the largest and most influential environmental event in Estonia.





In Colombia, we had more than 350 cleanup locations. More than 22,000 people participated. We collected more than 720 tons of waste and 15,000 cigarette butts. More than 2,000 gigabytes were eliminated through digital cleanups.

This all thanks to the support of the team of national leaders and all the volunteers—with help from nonprofit organisations and the communities within each territory.

We appreciate all the effort, time and dedication that all these people contributed to Día Mundial de Limpieza (WCD) 2022. For us, it is a pleasure and an honour to have your support, volunteering and leadership. This year we broke our records thanks to the efforts of the entire team of national leaders and volunteers.

We continue with our environmental education, through our conscious consumption and circular economy campaigns.

We did it, Colombia!!







Voluntary activities are always challenging and bring amazing stories—especially in obtuse and complex situations

Our story began when we received a call from the authorities just one day before World Cleanup Day 2022, saying that we must halt all of our plans for the event, despite the permissions we had previously received from them.

WCD 2022 coincided with one of Iran's most important religious mourning rituals, which was going to bring hundreds of thousands of people out all over the country. The authorities had concerns about traffic issues and people's safety. Moreover, the happy nature of WCD was not considered a good match for the mourning ritual's atmosphere.

We had been working hard all year to prepare for the big day, and now this message was going to ruin everything. A real predicament! After a short amount of time, we pulled ourselves together and figured out the situation.

IRAN

Although we had only a few hours left, we decided not to give up—we would find a solution. We tried our best to reach out to the organisers of the big religious ceremony to discuss any possibility of cooperation. Even though we were short on time, we finally managed to make agreements with some of them at the last moment convincing them to join us, with their members, to take part in cleanup activities that we had organised in populated spots.

In the end, the outcome was fantastic. We made the most out of an unexpected, complicated situation. Not only was the number of participants beyond our expectations, but the organisers also expressed their desire to continue this cooperation in the following year.

Therefore, I would say that WCD 2022 was the biggest and most impactful event we have ever had. Here is my advice to all friends: whenever you encounter a difficulty, just remember this quote which says, "Either I will find a way, or I will make one!".



INDIA

Let's Do It India gathered more than 2 million people on World Cleanup Day 2022—in all 29 states, including 642 cities and 7842 schools, with the support of 64 ministries and municipal corporations, 55 companies, and 60 universities and institutions.

Let's Do It India, since its inception in 2018, has grown to now be working with more than 5,500 active volunteers all across the country. We work to bring positive social change to create a better future through environmental protection campaigns and initiatives. These cover areas such as education, governance, health and wellness, cleanup activities and promoting sustainable tourism and cultural activities—in all sectors of society that fit closely with the Let's Do It India spirit.

Throughout the year, we mobilise the masses by organising webinars, workshops and leaders academies quarterly—for which the Ministry of the Environment is the supporting partner.

Let's Do It India has been working as a mobilising engine, driving the youngest country in the world to become the cleanest country in the world.







World Cleanup Day is celebrated all over the world as a way of drawing attention to the problem of the production and disposal of waste and its impact on the environment and health. In Mozambique, the event aims to mobilise the whole of society to ensure a healthy environment and better quality of life for the population.

In the particular case of Mozambique, World Cleanup Day 2022 took place across 16-17 September. The 16th was dedicated to cleanup actions, awareness raising, lectures and other activities at primary schools throughout the country—with a record participation of 1,500,000 volunteers. The date was strategically chosen with the top management of the Ministry of Education and Human Development, as a way to ensure the maximum participation of children and adolescents—through lectures, followed by cleaning actions, in schools. Across the country, volunteers from Let's Do It Mozambique joined with teachers to ensure the success of World Cleanup Day in schools.

On the 17th, we had the highest participation rate ever in Mozambique—with the participation of around 500,000 volunteers cleaning up beaches, neighbourhoods and communities. The amount of solid waste collected reached an incredible 7,000 tons. To achieve this, coordination with the Ministry of Land and Environment—as well as the relevant provincial, district and municipal entities was decisive.

In terms of volunteer participation at the national level, the location that attracted the largest number between 16-17 September was the city of Maputo, engaging 353,347 participants. In second place was the Maputo Province, with 317,655 participants. In third place, the Nampula Province, in the north of the country, with 283,876 participants.

Well in advance of World Cleanup Day, a series of capacity building sessions were held between 17 August and 14 September. The sessions aimed to promote World Cleanup Day to activists, volunteers, partners, provincial focal points and any citizens interested in the training. The main themes of the capacity building sessions were:

- i. Impact of Waste Pollution;
- ii. Initiation to World Cleanup Day;
- iii. Educating for Cleanliness;
- iv. Zero Waste from Home;
- v. Circular Economy.

The choice of themes aimed to ensure that, after World Cleanup Day, efforts could be carried out at the local level to keep public spaces clean. In total, 1408 participants benefited from the capacity building actions for World Cleanup Day. They covered the southern, central and northern regions of the country, which played a key role in the success of the event in terms of coordination, logistics and data sharing.

Global Projects and campaigns

LDIW Annual Conference 2022 27-30 January

More than 1000 people registered for the Let's Do It World Conference, held virtually from 27-30 January 2022. The conference was organised by the Let's Do It Indonesia team, in collaboration with Let's Do It Germany and Let's Do It World HQ.

Across four days, 20+ sessions took place—with 63 extraordinary speakers from around the world sharing best practice examples, inspirational personal stories, new experiences, and discoveries on how to move forwards towards a waste-free world. It was not just a conference—it was a gathering of the big Let's Do It World family!





Expo 2020 Dubai, 1 October 2021 - 31 March 2022



Expo 2020 was hosted by Dubai, in the United Arab Emirates, from 1 October 2021 to 31 March 2022. Originally scheduled for 20 October 2020 to 10 April 2021, it was postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Let's Do It World participated at Expo 2020 Dubai as part of the official Estonian National Booth.


At the booth, World Cleanup Day and Digital Cleanup Day were introduced to visitors of the event. Additionally, LDIW initiated a Digital Cleanup Challenge between Expo 2020 Dubai pavilions and their guests—encouraging them to delete surplus pictures and videos, especially those taken during the event.

Altogether, 51 country pavilions took part in the Expo 2020 Dubai Digital Cleanup Challenge—deleting more than 78,000 GB of data. Heidi Solba, President of Let's Do It World, and Anneli Ohvril, Executive Director of Let's Do It World, acknowledged the highest performing pavilions and publicly celebrated the results of the initiative. 40

Digital Cleanup Day 2022, 19 March

Digital Cleanup Day 2022 took place on 19 March 2022 for the third time—engaging people in 124 countries to tackle climate change. Individuals and communities all over the world deleted unnecessary files from their devices. The highest number of participants were from **Taiwan**, followed by the **United States** and **Spain**. The largest campaign was held in **France**.

530,884 GB of data was deleted as a result of the event. Around 1 billion tons of CO2 are produced by the internet and its supporting systems each year. Digital Cleanup Day's results will lead to a reduction of approximately 133 tons of CO2 being emitted, helping to slow down climate change.






Asia Leaders Academy 29-31 July

Asia and Oceania Leaders Academy 2022 was held online from 29-31 July, with more than 70 attendees from 20 countries participating. Leaders at the Academy had the pleasure of learning from seven guest speakers. They came from a variety of backgrounds—both industry and government— to share their professional perspectives on how to scale up our sustainability plans and efforts. For example, through circular innovation for agriculture, or engaging youth in long-term environmental protection projects.

It was a very inspiring three days! Enormous gratitude to all the speakers, and—of course—to the preparations teams, Let's Do It Taiwan and Let's Do It Indonesia. Huge thanks also to Leo Lin, Regional Director for Asia, and Agustina Iskandar, Regional Coordinator for Asia. Once again, leaders had the chance to bond. As Chun Hui from Singapore said: "Unity is strength! Thank you all!".



Let's Do It Taiwan will host the Asia Leaders Academy 2023 in Taiwan as a physical gathering. The in-person and virtual events will be facilitated by Heart Valley ESG Education Park, an influential social enterprise in Taiwan.

Official UN Day Proposal

In September 2021, UN-Habitat CEO Maimunah Mohd Sharif made a proposal to President Kersti Kaljulaid during her visit to Kenya—that she consider presenting the World Cleanup Day to the UN General Assembly, in order for it to be declared one of the UN's official days. World Cleanup Day is a proven model for involving people in solving environmental problems. Let's Do It World has begun the process with the Government of Estonia, to make this proposal to the UN.

Having World Cleanup Day as an official UN Day is essential for increasing visibility, and therefore creating a bigger impact in society. It would help to deepen the cooperation between LDIW and its member organisations with the public and civil society organisations. The resolution—with the proposal to declare World Cleanup Day as an official UN Day—will be first voted upon in June at the UN-Habitat General Assembly. The final vote will take place in September 2023, at the UN General Assembly in New York.



LDIW Global Summit 2022, 5-8 July

LDIW hosted a Global Summit from 5-8 July in Klaara-Manni Eco-Resort in Estonia. More than 30 Let's Do It leaders from different countries gathered in Estonia, following more than two years of pandemic-related restrictions.

The leaders shared knowledge and wisdom about their various green projects, through which they aim to shape the environment of their countries. They also shared a diverse range of challenges faced and solutions found—showcasing the diversity of the world we live in.





The wildness of the Estonian countryside where the event was located, with the Pärnumaa and Klaara Manni hiking roads, as well as beautiful Soomaa National Park, gave a strong undercurrent of meaning around the purpose of our movement's existence—to protect nature, and to work together for our common home all around the world.

Projects from the Network


IRRC: Integrated Resource Recovery Center in Sakrand, Pakistan

The Integrated Resource Recovery Center (IRRC) delivers environmental, health, and economic benefits to society. The IRRC, led by Abdul Haq Banglani, from Constant Waste, and Let's Do It Pakistan in Sakrand, is now providing jobs for 40 workers. The Centre's aim is to collect waste and segregate it into eight different waste streams.

The IRRC is able to sell good quality segregated and cleaned materials to be reused—being put into circulation once again. One by-product of the project is quality composting material that can be reused in gardens, parks, schools and farms. The Center also enables studies and research projects for many students from universities and academies, and is a scalable example that other countries can follow.



Let's Do It Romania's app to boost collaboration with local authorities



The Let's Do It Romania app, created by Ionut Iordachescu, collects data about illegal waste dumps in communities and enables their reporting to local authorities. Having the correct information enables the creation of legal petitions, which will ensure that local authorities take care of illegal waste dumps and report having done so back to the system therefore making it visible to the whole of society.

The first pilot project provided data on 5,000 tons of waste. It also confirmed that authorities are interested in such a system, as it establishes a communication flow both to and from citizens. This initiative creates an incentive for the authorities to do more themselves, and they do want to do more! Another benefit is communities becoming more confident about pushing the issue to the authorities, and seeing that the problem will be fixed when they do.

The Let's Do It Romania platform can be a model for any other country. Know-how is needed for the legal framework to support the system, and Ionut Iordachescu has created a team to improve the system's scalability to other countries. Additionally, a reward system will be implemented—to gamify the whole process.

Let's Do It Namibia leading the Sustainable Environmental Education Programme

The Sustainable Environmental Educational Programme (SEEP) is run by Let's Do It World and Let's Do It Namibia with the noble cause of transferring environmental education knowledge and activities in African schools. In line with the UN Sustainable Development Goals, the programme aims to raise awareness of environmental behaviour best practice with a special focus on solid waste, climate change and laying the foundations for the circular economy transition.

The project engaged 42 schools across Namibia, providing

education and empowerment and inspiring the creation of green projects within the schools—supported by environmental education mentors. Winning projects were selected to highlight the success of the project in the media, with support from the local authorities—including Namibia's Ministry of Education and Ministry of Environment. We are looking forward to expanding the model of the SEEP project to other countries within the Let's Do It World network. The program is supported by the Estonian Development Fund.



Let's do it Ukraine SOS

Since the first days of the war, the team of the All-Ukrainian youth movement, Let's do it Ukraine, with the support of the international movement Let's Do It World, mobilised all its forces and united volunteers, organisations, municipalities, and opinion leaders around the world to create one of the largest international humanitarian projects: Let's do it Ukraine SOS. The project has been created to save the lives of civilians by providing them with basic necessities, such as water, food, medicine, warm clothes, etc.

Today, 8,961 volunteers are involved in the implementation of the humanitarian mission and another 469 logistics volunteers are participating from various parts of Ukraine.

Since March 2022, "Let's do it Ukraine SOS" volunteers have:


Sourced and distributed **9,814.6 tons** of humanitarian aid

Distributed 599,354 food kits

Provided humanitarian aid to **1,152,548 Ukrainians**

Organised the logistics of humanitarian aid in different parts of Ukraine

In total, support to Ukrainians was provided to the equivalent of \$147.2 million.



Let's do it Ukraine is also actively working to create a network of humanitarian shelters for internally displaced persons, "Let's do it Ukraine Houses". Volunteers have arranged shelters and coworking centres in old buildings, so that both civilians and activists have a safe place to live, develop and work remotely. These houses were created in Kyiv, Chernivtsi and Dnipropetrovsk regions.



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The Circular Economy Community Project, Mozambique

Besides their regular cleanups, Let's Do It Mozambique also focuses on environmental education and circular economy projects. The organisation buys glass, plastic and tin from waste collectors and puts these materials to use in the circular economy, and in the restoration of ecosystems. For example, producing building blocks out of glass powder—made from grinding up used glass. One of the most acclaimed projects, led by Let's Do It Mozambique leader Carlos Serra and the team, involves the reuse of 170,000 glass bottles as the main material to build an educational centre for the community!

Another fundamental activity is environmental education. Carlos, who has experience of working within the Ministry, had the opportunity to test environmental education methodologies in rural community areas. The team has provided environmental education to children in remote communities, and accompanied teachers to carry out environmental actions in schools.



Ecoins in Costa Rica

The ecological and innovative ecoins story starts in Costa Rica—one of the countries that bridges between North America and South America. Like all of us in the Let's Do It World global family, we focus on sustainable solutions, seeing what works well and can have a significant impact on the future.

Let's Do It Costa Rica's leader, Karla Chaves, considers ecoins to be an important part of the economy. Ecoins is a company that offers a loyalty program to reward people for recycling. Active in Costa Rica, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Peru, El Salvador and Argentina, users of ecoins register as recyclers and are assigned a location to which they must deliver recyclable goods. In return for these goods—which must be cleaned, dried, and separated to be accepted—the recyclers receive a financial reward in the form of ecoins. These ecoins can be spent on a range of discounted products, purchased via the ecoins platform.





UN Stockholm+50 2-3 June

Stockholm+50 was a high-level international meeting convened by the United Nations General Assembly. It was held in Stockholm, Sweden, from 2-3 June 2022. The event marked fifty years since the UN Conference on the Human Environment, which took place in 1972 and was the first gathering of global leaders to focus seriously on the world's environmental issues. Even back then, it was recognised that the situation was getting out of hand, and 114 heads of state signed a number of significant environmental resolutions. As a result of that 1972 conference, the United Nations Environment Programme was created.

According to June's conference report, in the past 50 years, we have managed to achieve barely a tenth of the commitments made. The channelling of resources towards environmental protection and the levels of cooperation between organisations to deliver what has been agreed upon have been poor.

Let's Do It World was presented at the event "Youth Perspectives from Paris to Stockholm and Sharm el-Sheikh". This event provided a roadmap for youth leading up to COP 27, and discussed how Stockholm+50 could contribute to COP27—by having a clear work plan and associated activities, focused on the 1.5 degree objective as a goal from the Paris Agreement. The event was organised by Ahmed Mohamed Fathy, the Leader of Let's Do It Egypt and the Founder of Youth Love Egypt Foundation.





World Environment Day

World Cleanup Day 2022 was launched on 15 June in the European House Berlin, with greetings from Roberta Metsola, Ursula von der Leyen and Franziska Giffey, and a big cleanup event in Tiergarten Park. At the European House Berlin, Let's Do It World HQ and Let's Do It Germany called on people around the world to join the fifth World Cleanup Day for a clean, healthy, and waste-free planet.

Among others, video messages from the President of the European Parliament, Roberta Metsola, the President of the European Commission, Ursula von der Leyen, and the Governing Mayor of Berlin Franziska Giffey were shown. All three of these politicians are supporters of WCD. Fifty young people were also invited, to take part in a dialogue around littering and environmental protection.

Kenya Delegation visit to LDIW HQ 16-20 May

Let's Do It World hosted a delegation from Kenya from 16-20 May in Estonia, which was led by Nairobi Governor Her Excellency Anne Kananu, with County Minister of Environment Larry Wambua, high officials from Nairobi County Government, the National Environmental Management Authority, and Christine Sayo and Oscar Wanjala from Let's do it Kenya. The exchange visit was organised by Let's Do It Kenya and the Let's Do It HQ. The delegation met policymakers and environmental stakeholders and visited a number of environmental initiatives. The team also met former Estonian President Kersti Kaljulaid.

Governor Kananu noted that the Nairobi City County team was here to collaborate and learn, and if possible, to adopt some of the advanced technologies that Estonia has—such as e-Estonia—for conducting environmental education and project implementation. The Estonian people are entrepreneurial and innovative, and the government is supportive of technology and small business.





From Let's Do It World, Heidi Solba, President and Head of the Global Network, and Luan Hasanaj, Country leader for Kosovo, plus his team, took part in the event and cleanups. There is now talk of holding this kind of launch event in Brussels next year, for the whole European Region! Thank you, Let's Do It Germany.

LDIW Advocacy

World Urban Forum, 26-30 June 2022

From 26-30 June 2022, Let's Do It World took part in the 11th World Urban Forum (WUF11). This event is recognised as the foremost global arena for interaction among key highlevel policymakers, local government leaders, NGOs and stakeholders, to discuss global urbanisation challenges and solutions.

We had the honour of representing Let's Do It World at two sessions within the World Urban Forum programme, as well as attending many other sustainability-related sessions. In the first session, UN-Habitat and LDIW co-led a discussion on the importance of citizen engagement, showcasing World Cleanup Day as a powerful platform to transform societies and boost cross-sectoral cooperation. We highlighted how crucial it is to engage 5% of the population in collective actions with all stakeholders, in order to drive forward a social shift to the maximum level.



At the second session, we were involved in the panel discussion, led by the Egyptian Government, who was hosting COP27. The main output from the discussion was agreement on the urgent need for stronger collaboration, greater trust among stakeholders, simpler solutions, and greater citizen engagement in the decision-making process. Challenges at all levels still include, among others, the prioritisation of investments and the engagement of displaced communities.

COP 27 6-20 November



The United Nations Climate Change Conference COP27 was held from 6-20 November 2022, in Sharm El Sheikh, Egypt. It closed with a breakthrough agreement to provide "loss and damage" funding for vulnerable countries hit hard by climate disasters.

Let's Do It World attended the Conference and led several meetings and panels about World Cleanup Day—with the key message that big civic movements are powerful tools to achieve seismic social shifts. COP27 also marked an important milestone in Let's Do It World's development. A meeting with UN-Habitat Chief Executive, Ms. Maimunah Mohd Sharif, and with Minister of Environment of the Estonian Republic, Mr. Madis Kallas, focused on accelerating social shifts in society. Interest from the UN to help create a bigger impact by integrating World Cleanup Day into the official UN calendar was discussed. With support from the Estonian government, the UN will vote on including World Cleanup Day as an official day in the UN Calendar, at the next UN General Assembly, in September 2023.

The Government of the Republic of Estonia

The Government of the Republic of Estonia is the main partner applying for World Cleanup Day to be a UN official day, to be decided by the UN General Assembly in September in New York. Since the beginning, the Estonian government has been a strong supportive partner for the Let's Do It World HQ and the movement overall.

UN-Habitat

Let's Do It World was elected into the Waste Wise Cities UN-Habitat Advisory Board in 2020, to provide expertise in the fields of global campaigns and community engagement activities. This Board member status was extended for 2021 and 2022.

UN-Habitat and Let's Do It World entered into a partnership in 2021, with the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding. Together, we are working to build inclusive, safe and resilient communities and cities. This collaboration includes activities around sustainable waste management; encouraging a positive perception of waste; shifting mindsets from waste to resources; participation in local, national, regional and international events in support of Waste Wise Cities, and World Cleanup Day itself.



The UN SDG Action Campaign—together with over 1,700 organisations—mobilises millions of people around the world to take action on the SDGs, via public engagement, activations, stunts, and organised events. Let's Do It World was the Convening Partner for the UN Act4SDGs campaign. The global week to #Act4SDGs ran from 16-25 September and mobilised more than 145 million actions, from over 190 countries—among them, Let's Do It World's World Cleanup Day. These actions had a positive impact on efforts to accelerate the Sustainable Development Goals and make a difference for both people and planet. The UN SDG Action Campaign and Let's Do It World come together in regular strategy meetings, to identify further areas where collaborative engagement could be optimised.





Earth Day

Two of the world's largest global environmental organisations—Let's Do It World and Earth Day—are united in working towards a waste-free world. Earth Day's mission is to diversify, educate, and activate the environmental movement worldwide. Growing out of the first Earth Day in 1970, EARTHDAY.ORG is one of the world's largest recruiters to the environmental movement—working with more than 150,000 partners in nearly 192 countries to build environmental democracy. More than 1 billion people now participate in Earth Day activities each year, making it the largest civic observance in the world. Its flagship volunteer initiative, The Great Global Cleanup™, engages millions of volunteers in creating clean communities worldwide.

UNEP

Let's Do It World is an accredited member of the UN Environment Programme and UN Environment Assembly.



ACNOA

The National Olympic Committees of Africa are Let's Do It World's biggest partner on the African Continent. This year, the Association of National Olympic Committees of Africa (ACNOA) came up with a strategy to celebrate and participate in World Cleanup Day on 17 September 2022. Activities ranged from waste collection and cleaning of gutters to cleaning of cities and beaches. These ingenious operations were all carried out by the National Olympic Committees, who joined forces with government and civil society partners to ensure the success of this event across Africa. The values remained consistent for ANOCA—putting sport at the centre of environmentally-friendly activities and sustainable development, and raising awareness among African youth of the importance of a clean sports environment.





Funding

Public Sector

The activities of the Let's Do It World Headquarters are primarily funded by the public sector. The biggest funder is the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Estonia's fund for development cooperation and humanitarian aid, the Environment Fund of Estonia, and the Government Office of Estonia. 
